Read Hebrews 1:3, Revelation 10:8-10

Do you have a verse that has been a regular support for you throughout your life? When did it take on significance and what does it mean to you?

When John ate the scroll in Revelation, it was sweet and then sour. What about Scripture have you found the hardest to stomach?

Since the angel told John to expect both reactions, that suggests God knows his word will not always be pleasant to us. Does the freedom to admit parts of the Bible feel "sour" change anything?

In the sermon it was mentioned that the gospel, the good news about Jesus, precedes both the Old Testament and the New Testament. How does that change the way we read the Bible?

P.T. Forsyth said, "The Word of God is in the Bible on the way to the soul." What does it mean to think of Scripture being "living and active" and personal, instead of simply static words on a page?
